SOCIETY REPRESENTED AT TWO CONVENTIONS

The Metropolitan Region Convention of the Wisconsin Council for Local History, of which our Society is a member, was held Sept. 26. The host was the Bay View Historical Society.

The historic Avalon Theatre was the site of the convention and tours of the 1920 building were offered. Dale Kuntz, movie historian and president of Milwaukee Film Classics, talked about movie stars of the 1930s and '40s. A concert was also performed on the Avalon's magnificent pipe organ. In the afternoon, there was a slide show about "Historic Bay View" at the South Shore pavilion.

The Annual Convention of the Wisconsin Council for Local History was held Oct. 16 and 17 and highlighted the state's ethnic history.

CHAD DID A GREAT JOB

Chad Stier of Oak Creek is an Eagle Scout candidate. He decided to work on improving the Lake Protestant Cemetery for his Eagle project. His letter to the Society is reprinted below and describes the jobs he completed in the cemetery.

Dear Chief Schwingle and Historical Society members: I am writing this letter for three reasons:

- To inform the Historical Society that my Boy Scout Eagle project in the Lake Protestant Cemetery is now completed.
- 2. To describe, and show, what tasks I and my crew of helpers accomplished.
- 3. Simply to thank you.


As mentioned above, my Eagle project is finally complete in the cemetery. I started back on February 11, 1986 by looking over the cemetery to see if there were any jobs that I could undertake that would improve or upgrade the cemetery in some way. I found that there were, indeed, many things that could be done. Several months elapsed in which time I formulated ideas, sought advice, obtained the necessary permissions, attended numerous City Council and Historical Society meetings, and the lite. The actual labor of niv ultimate two-year long project finally commenced on August 17, 1986. For the rest of that summer and again in the summer of 87, we removed thirty-nine stumps by digging and chopping them out. Their sizes ranged from a small of 2" in diameter up through 45" measured at ground level with the average size being about 17" to 20" accross. This stuny removal phase of my project was completed on June 7, 1987. My emphasis then switched to completely rebuilding the Norwich Avenue steps leading up into the convelory. Again more letters and meetings were necessary in order to make another idea workable. On August 11, 1987, new materials were purchased and on August 18, the actual work began on installing the new steps. As the photos enclosed will bear me out, we removed five steps and installed eight new ones. A sturdy railing was exected where none was there before and a concrete approach was poured at the base. Sod was then layed. Finally, on August 30, 1987, our endeavors paid off as the stepaphase of this project was completely finished. If I might say so my self, the finished product turned out quite well.

We (myself, fellow Boy Scouts, Adult leaders from my Troop), have enjoyed the numerous Sundays of these past two summers working in the Lake Cemetery toward my two goals of stumps removal and steps reconstruction. I have found it especially rewarding that the St. Francis Historical Society, especially Chief Robert Schwingle, cooperated with my efforts by offering guidance and advice for me to accomplish the goals that I set out to do. As other boys in my Boy Scout troop become of age and are anticipating doing their forthcoming Eagle projects, of which some of them may very well be in this same cemetery, I trust that the Historical Society members will again be receptive to their ideas as you were toward mine.


