This report by Lilly Stelmaszewski is part of our Oral History Project. She grew up in the "Lupo House", which is now the headquarters of the St. Francis Historical Society. Lilly and her husband, Chuck, now live in Florida.

When we moved to St. Francis(Town of Lake) in July of 1940, there were very few houses on Packard Avenue near our house. There was a house next door where the Stephen Miller family lived. It was like a small farm. They had chickens, pigs, horses and a garden. There was Kucik's house on Packard. They had cows. Next door was Vretnars old house. There were also one or two very old farm houses across Packard Avenue from our house. Later on there was a trailer park where Greene Park is now. I also remember Barnes gas station on the corner where Packard Avenue and Lake Drive meet.

Our house was on a hill. On the south side at the bottom of the hill there was a creek with a small bridge where my brother and I crossed the creek to go to St. Fredericks school. Sometimes the creek overflowed in winter and froze and we would ice skate there. Of course, everyone members "Bessies Hill" where we went sledding.

Our big entertainment was going to the Majestic or the Cudahy theaters, and going to Tompkins for a sundae or a malt after the movie.
