STATE CONVENTION

The annual meeting of the Wisconsin Council for Local History will be held Oct. 25 and 26 at the State Historical Society in Madison. On Saturday, affiliate members will meet Dr. H. Nicholas Muller, new director of the state society. During his keynote address, he will speak about the position of state and local history in the practice of history. The address will be followed by seminars in a variety of areas.

A special feature of the convention is a bus trip to Janesville to view "Culture and Agriculture," a cooperative exhibit produced by 13 local historical societies and the Office of Local History. The 4,000 square foot exhibit explores twelve areas of the state, especially farming in local communities. Tourgoers will also visit Cooksville, a village which retains mid-nineteenth century charm with New England-style houses and a public square. The tour ends in Evansville where over 300 buildings comprise one of the largest historic districts in Wisconsin.

Several members of our Society plan to attend the convention.



FIRST OF ITS KIND

The St. Francis Historical Society was the host Aug. 10 for the 1985 Metropolitan Region Convention of the Wisconsin Council for Local History. As part of the packet given each conventioneer, a ceramic mug commemorating St. Francis as the site of the convention was included. The State Historical Society took note of the mug with its red and white "St. Francis" lettering and has subsequently asked for one of the mugs for its archives. It seems this was the first time a quality souvenir of this type was offered as a convention keepsake!


